RE: Supplement to the Final Environmental Statement for the Rare Earths Facility, West Chicago, DuPage County, IL (54 FR 18054, April 26, 1989; 54 FR 18331, April 28, 1989)

Dear Chairman Zech:

Enclosed are the comments of the Illinois Department of Nuclear Safety and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency on the above-referenced document. Our comments on the Draft Supplement were submitted to you by Governor James R. Thompson on September 29, 1987. While the NRC Staff has made changes in the Final Supplement based on our comments and the comments of others, the NRC Staff has not changed its conclusion that the NRC should approve Kerr-McGee's proposal to dispose of the mill tailings on-site in West Chicago, Illinois. For reasons stated in our enclosed comments, we believe the action recommended by the NRC Staff would be contrary to applicable law and regulations and extremely bad policy.

Our greatest concern is the acknowledged failure of the Proposed Action to meet the goal of permanently isolating the wastes without active maintenance. Not only will contaminants continue to leach into the groundwater, we do not believe it has been shown that the disposal cell will be able to retain its integrity without active maintenance. Moreover, the West Chicago site is within an urban area, and the geologic conditions are known not to contribute to immobilization and isolation of contaminants from groundwater sources. Thus, the required active maintenance may very well magnify with time. Further exacerbating our concern is the fact that, under the monitoring plan proposed by Kerr-McGee and found acceptable by the NRC Staff, Kerr-McGee would maintain the disposal cell for two five-year periods after completion of the cell and then either the State or federal government would have to maintain the cell for the following 990 years. The eventual determination of whether this 990-year maintenance responsibility eventually rests with the State or the federal government remains uncomfortingly undecided. We obviously reject the notion that this 990-year maintenance responsibility should rest with the State.

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> A second concern is that the Proposed Action was not properly reached within the context of the process established by the National Environmental Policy Act. We believe that the selection of the studied alternatives was biased, leading to selection of the Proposed Action. For example, the environmental impact statement uses an unsupported assumption regarding disbursement of wastes during transportation that significantly distorts the comparison of costs and benefits of the proposed action against those of alternatives which involve rail transport of the wastes. The use of a different assumption would dramatically alter the comparison and provide, in our view, a much more realistic analysis.

The Supplement to the Final Environmental Statement is inadequate in numerous respects. The NRC Staff must withdraw the statement and revise it to comply with the requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act. We believe that a fully corrected statement would support the State of Illinois's position that the waste be removed from West Chicago and disposed at a properly selected site.

Copies of our comments are being provided to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the Council on Environmental Quality. Copies of the transmittal letters to Deputy Administrator Habicht and Chairman Designate Deland are enclosed for your information.
