The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) is considering a license request from Radiant Industries, Inc. (Radiant) for the R-50 project in Roane County, Tennessee.

As part of the NRC's licensing review, the NRC staff is initiating Section 106 consultation under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended (NHPA). See attached correspondence.

The NRC staff is also preparing an environmental assessment (EA) in accordance with 10 CFR Part 51, "Environmental Protection Regulations for Domestic Licensing and Related Regulatory Functions," the NRC's regulations that implement the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended (NEPA). In accordance with 36 CFR 800 "Protection of Historic Properties" Section 800.8(c), the NRC is using the NEPA process to comply with NHPA Section 106, in lieu of the procedures set forth in 36 CFR 800.3 through 800.6.

The NRC staff invites you to submit any comments or concerns that you may have to offer on the NRC's Section 106 consultation and historic and cultural resources evaluation.
