In your letter/letters you raised concerns about Millstone and the continued lack of an emergency management plan for Eastern Long Island. As noted in my previous letters, proposals have been made to both increase and decrease the 10-mile emergency planning zone (EPZ) distance since this policy was established following the accident at Three Mile Island in 1979. After consideration of these proposals and their supporting document and rationale, the Commission has consistently concluded that an EPZ of about 10 miles in radius provides an acceptable planning basis for emergency response.

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Again, I assure you that the NRC continues to monitor the performance of Millstone to ensure that public health and safety are adequately protected. The NRC is committed to the level of regulatory oversight needed to carry out this mandate. I appreciate your bringing your concerns to the attention of the NRC.
