Culture for Safety

- All organizations have a culture.
- Behavior is an outcome of the existing culture.
- Behaviors impact performance, e.g., safety, security, production.
- Just measuring performance outcomes does not always reflect underlying cultural assumptions.
- Assessment focus should include all levels of culture by measuring underlying values and attitudes and determining how they influence behavior.



How the Three Levels of Culture Differ

Artifacts: People wearing appropriate PPE; security screening for people entering the facility.

Claimed Values: Lost time injuries of less than 1 hour for every 100 hours worked for this quarter; 'if you see something say something'.

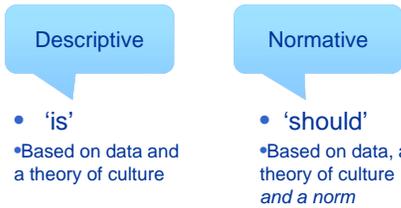
Basic Assumptions: People will always make mistakes; our facility is impenetrable.

Typically assessments focus on artifacts and claimed values with less or no emphasis on determining the basic assumptions.



Aspects of Cultural Assessments

- Need to separate *descriptive* and *normative* aspects of cultural assessments.



Assessment of Culture – Lessons Learned

- Necessary to have diversity of expertise in assessing culture and analyzing the impact on performance.
- Multiple methods of data collection are needed to understand the existing culture and provide convergent validity to the results.
- Need to consider the complexity of culture to understand how it impacts performance (systemic perspective).
- Consideration must be given to the interaction of human, organizational and technological factors.
- More effective culture assessment activities attempt to address all three levels of culture.



Summary

- All aspects of performance are influenced by culture.
- Important to understand the three levels of culture—artifacts, espoused values, basic assumptions, in assessing culture.
- Every organization has a safety culture, but do they have a culture for safety is the more relevant question to ask for sustainability.
