## NRC to Hold Virtual Meeting to Discuss Duke Energy's Nuclear Plant Performance

ATLANTA, Ga.—Nuclear Regulatory Commission staff will hold a [virtual public meeting](#) April 29 to discuss the 2025 safety performance of Brunswick, Catawba, Harris, McGuire, Oconee and Robinson nuclear power plants. Brunswick, Harris and McGuire are in North Carolina. Catawba, Oconee and Robinson are in South Carolina. All six plants are operated by Duke Energy.

The meeting will run from 6-7 p.m. Eastern time and will be held using [Microsoft Teams](#). Participants can also join by phone by calling 301-576-2978 and entering passcode 362411854#. NRC employees responsible for plant inspections, including the resident inspectors based full-time at each site, will be available to answer questions following a short presentation.

The NRC concluded that Brunswick, Harris, McGuire, Oconee and Robinson operated safely in 2025 and were under the agency's normal level of oversight, which includes thousands of inspection hours each year. Catawba Units 1 and 2 also operated safely, but Unit 2 was under increased oversight during the first quarter of 2025 due to an issue involving a ventilation system that was not properly maintained. The unit returned to normal oversight in March after inspectors completed a supplemental inspection and confirmed the issue was resolved.
